St. Ambrose:

The only reason for Jesus mixing clay with the spittle and smearing it on the eyes of the man born blind was to remind you that he who restored the man to health by anointing his eyes with clay is the very One who fashioned the first man out of clay. 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Dear Parishioners,

Those of you who attended the 11am Mass and 7pm Mass at Good Shepherd would have participated in the RCIA Scrutinies for the Elect—those in our parish preparing for baptism and initiation into the Catholic Church at the Easter Vigil this year. There are three scrutinies, celebrated on the 3rd, 4th and 5th Sundays of Lent, and they are central to the Elect's spiritual preparation for initiation. The purpose of the scrutinies is "to uncover, then heal all that is weak, defective, or sinful in the hearts of the elect" and "to bring out, then strengthen all that is upright, strong, and good" (RCIA, 141). The scrutinies hold significant power for both the elect and the baptized faithful, for as the elect celebrate the scrutinies in the midst of the community, the rites are meant to become a powerful experience that inspire the baptized (all of you!) to seek God's love and grace through the sacrament of reconciliation. In last week's bulletin, I published the additional Confession times and the Penitential Service coming up soon. Please take note and take advantage of these days of mercy.

As this time is a period of deepening conversion, not only for the Elect, but for everyone of us, I'm sharing here some testimonies written by those soon-to-be-Catholic on their recent experience at Holy Rosary Cathedral at the Rite of Election:

In November 2022, I was blessed by an experience in a Catholic church in Mexico in which I felt I was being told to bring my son closer to God, and that this was the piece missing from our household and my parenting. Back home, I reached out to our local parish, Star of the Sea, to inquire about Catholicism and asked if I could be Baptized. Father Augustine and Janice explained about RCIA and invited me to take the classes. One year and four months later, I found myself shaking hands with our Archbishop Michael, as I passed from being a Catechumen to a member of the Elect. I have learned more about God in the last 6 months of RCIA than I had in my 40 years. I understand that God does indeed seek us out, and my fears of not being good enough to reach back out to Him were based in my lack of knowledge of the teaching within the Bible. As I journey through this season of Lent and the three Scrutinies, I see myself and my past reflected in these stories. How comforting to see that as a doctor comes to the sick, Jesus will accept me as I am and come to heal those deep wounds I have carried in silence for so long. ~ Ash

As I look back on my journey to the Rite of Election, it's like finding a light in the darkness. Before, I didn't have any faith, didn't believe in anything beyond what I could see. But then, something changed within me. I started seeking, asking questions about the meaning of life and what lies beyond. Discovering the Catholic faith was like finding a treasure I never knew existed. The Rite of Election was a pivotal moment for me. Surrounded by others on the same journey, I felt a sense of belonging and purpose. It's like I finally found my place in the world. Now, as one of the Elect, I'm filled with a sense of wonder and excitement. The final steps before Easter are a time of preparation and reflection. Each day brings new discoveries and challenges, but I know I'm not alone. The support of my sponsors, my parish community, and the Church at large has been a guiding light. In conclusion, my journey from disbelief to faith has been a remarkable one. The Rite of Election is not just a ceremony but a symbol of my transformation. I'm grateful for this opportunity and eager to continue growing in my newfound faith as I prepare to embrace the sacraments of initiation. ~ Jack



Reading 1: Samuel 16: 1, 6-7, 10-13; Psalm: 23: 1-3a, 3b-4, 5, 6

On these Sundays in Lent the liturgy takes us on a true and proper baptismal route through the texts of John's Gospel: last Sunday, Jesus promised the gift of "living water" to the Samaritan woman; today, by healing the man born blind, he reveals himself as "the light of the world"; next Sunday, in raising his friend Lazarus, he will present himself as "the resurrection and the life". Water, light and life are symbols of Baptism, the Sacrament that "immerses" believers in the mystery of the death and Resurrection of Christ, liberating them from the slavery of sin and giving them eternal life.

Let us reflect briefly on the account of the man born blind (Jn 9: 1-41). According to the common mentality of the time, the disciples take it for granted that his blindness was the result of a sin committed by him or his parents. Jesus, however, rejects this prejudice and says: "It was not that this man sinned, or his parents, but that the works of God might be made manifest in him" (v. 3). What comfort these words offer us! They let us hear the living voice of God, who is provident and wise Love! In the face of men and women marked by limitations and suffering, Jesus did not think of their possible guilt but rather of the will of God who created man for life. And so he solemnly declares: "We must work the works of him who sent me.... As long as I am in the world, I am the light of the world" (v. 5).

And he immediately takes action: mixing a little earth with saliva he made mud and spread it on the eyes of the blind man. This act alludes to the creation of man, which the Bible recounts using the symbol of dust from the ground, fashioned and enlivened by God's breath (Gn 2: 7). In fact, "Adam" means "ground" and the human body was in effect formed of particles of soil. By healing the blind man Jesus worked a new creation.

But this healing sparked heated debate because Jesus did it on the Sabbath, thereby in the Pharisees' opinion violating the feast-day precept. Thus, at the end of the account, Jesus and the blind man are both cast out, the former because he broke the law and the latter because, despite being healed, he remained marked as a sinner from birth.

Jesus reveals to the blind man whom he had healed that he had come into the world for judgement, to separate the blind who can be healed from those who do not allow themselves to be healed because they consider themselves healthy. Indeed, the temptation to build himself an ideological security system is strong in man: even religion can become an element of this system, as can atheism or secularism, but in letting this happen one is blinded by one's own selfishness.

Dear brothers and sisters, let us allow ourselves to be healed by Jesus, who can and wants to give us God's light! Let us confess our blindness, our shortsightedness, and especially what the Bible calls the "great transgression" (cf. Ps 19[18]: 13): pride. May Mary Most Holy, who by conceiving Christ in the flesh gave the world the true light, help us to do this.



The Untapped Power of the Sacrament of Penance: A Priest's View (234.4 Wal 2005) will help you understand how priests cherish the sacrament of reconciliation as a powerful movement of God's healing love. If you have abandoned the confessional out of fear or apathy or the conviction that you don't have any "real" sins to confess, this book will put you back on track.

Bau 1984) explains the
purpose of frequent
Confession and shows
how frequent



Confession can help you conquer sin (including venial sin), imperfections, self-love, and lukewarmness as well as improve your prayer life and give you growth in sacramental grace.

7 Secrets of Confession (234.4 Fly 1986) addresses a concern that any Catholics see confession as a means to an end: cleaning us up from sin so we can receive Communion, instead of seeing it as part of a journey to healing and holiness. If you do not yet look forward to Confession in the same way you look forward to Communion, this will change your life. FORMED has a discussion with the author under the same title.

Lord, Have Mercy: The Healing

Power of Confession (234.4 Hah 2003) Scott Hahn explores the sacrament of reconciliation and shows why it is the key to spiritual growth,




particularly in these times of intense anxiety and uncertainty. Drawing on the history, the writings of the early Church, and the lives of the saints, he reveals the Church's teachings on penance, forgiveness, and reconciliation.

How to Make a Good Confession: A Pocket Guide to Reconciliation with God (234.4 Kan 2001) This practical guide shows you how to transform your confessions from embarrassing moments in a dark room into profound experiences of God's love. It will help you renew your sense of God's mercy and examine your conscience to bring your life into greater conformity with the light of the gospel.

In Be Transformed: The Healing

Power of the Sacraments



including how reconciliation restores purity and releases us from shame.

FORMED has several digital options including Forgiven: The Transforming Power of Confession, a video series that explores the grace and healing offered in Confession and shows

how this sacrament of mercy reveals the depth and bounty of God's love. It is available in both Spanish and English versions. Fr. Mike Schmitz's audio presentation, Could God Ever Love Someone like Me?, debunks the lies we often believe about not being good enough to approach Jesus for reconciliation. Other audio-only talks include Freedom through Forgiveness: The Sacrament of Confession, which provides examples and insightful stories, Confession: Answering Common Objections, which responds to objections to this sacrament, and The Sacrament of Penance which reminds us that confession is the ordinary means for the forgiveness of mortal sins after baptism and a veritable treasury of graces and spiritual strength.

Brother Francis will help you introduce this sacrament to your children with the video *Forgiven*:

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
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
